On February 18, 2007, Kara Lennox presents a workshop on goal-setting (and achieving) specifically for writers entitled “Aim High and Shoot Straight.”

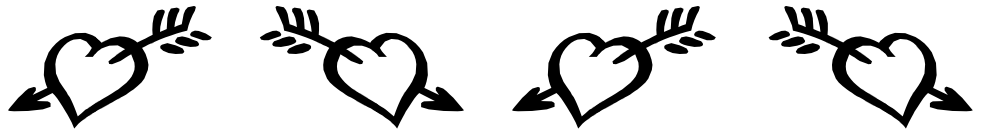

# Getting an Agent's Attention—The Good, the Bad, and the Ugly

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The following article first appeared in the May/June 2006 issue of the LARA Confidential, the newsletter of the Los Angeles Romance Authors chapter of RWA®.

Nephele Tempest is personable and straightforward. A former editorial assistant for Simon & Schuster, she moved to Los Angeles in 2002 as a freelance writer. In January 2005, she opened the west coast office of the prestigious Knight Agency.

"Let's start off with the ugly." Telling a horror story about a submission that grew to 1,000 plus printed pages, she pointed out it wasn't typical. Still, there are common mistakes that a first-time author can easily avoid.

"If you don't have your ducks in a row, you're not ready for an agent," she said. The two things to focus on are your approach to the business of writing, and the

content of your submission. Starting with research, get the sex, title, and city of the agent correct. Little errors of this sort won't add up to a rejection, but they do make an impression.

Get the agency guidelines correct; make sure your source is authentic. If you can't find the information anywhere, phone their office. They'll happily give you their submission guidelines.

As you submit, send exactly what the guidelines ask for. Following directions tells the agent a lot about how easy it'll be to work with you.

Create a list based on agencies acquiring new writers. List agents who might be good for your entire career, not just this one project. Put the names in your order of preference, and then submit.

When asked about self-addressed stamped post cards sent with

submissions, Nephele said, "It's a nice theory" The envelope is the perfect container and she doesn't open it until she reads your work. If an agent has a backlog of work, the package might go unopened for months. If you haven't heard anything within the time frame indicated for a query or even a request, contact the agent via e-mail or snail mail to follow-up.

Ms. Tempest was specific regarding query letters. Greet the agent and tell them why you're targeting them.

Do you have a friend on their client roster? Are you published? Did you meet at a conference? Next, give a two-paragraph blurb, similar to the back of a book. This is not a synopsis, but a summary with a hook. Make the agent think, "Cool. I want to read more." Enthusiasm in a writer goes a long way.

# Meeting Minutes

The general meeting started at 10:40. The guest speaker, Ann Marks, presented "Amazing Face Reading".

At 12:20, the general business meeting was called to order by President Jen FitzGerald.

It was noted that there was no November 2006 meeting, the December 2006 minutes were approved as corrected.

Tara Waldie, Treasurer, gave the information for two potential excursions during the July National meeting.

Choice one was the Bill Bates Dude Ranch: Base price includes a BBQ dinner, service bar with ice tea, coffee and soft drinks, hayride, and campfire with a singing cowboy. The cost is \$29.95 per person or \$44.57 per person including bus to and from hotel. (The excursion would be scheduled for the Tuesday night before conference.)

Second choice is a wine tasting tour at Delaney Vineyards. The cost is \$18.95 per person for 2 hrs. Which includes wine and cheese and a class on wines.

It was determined that there was a preference for Bill Bates Dude

Ranch with the wine tour being used for the November Writers Roundup. Tara is to obtain more information that will be presented at a later date.

Without objection, Tara Waldie gave the Treasurers report. Included in the report were 2006 year end numbers that are subject to audit before they are finalized.

Jen FitzGerald, President, gave the 2007 meeting dates, and 2007 board meeting dates. They will be published in the next newsletter.

Discussion was made on the 2007 November Writers Roundup meeting as to dates (NASCAR is a question as to its potential conflict.) and the direction we want to take. Do we want to make it more expensive like last year or to have it just for chapter members? The smaller Roundup would have more workshops in a smaller closer setting. A planning meeting will be held to determine the direction to present to the general membership for a vote. Angi Platt moved and it was seconded that all Writers Roundup ideas be researched and presented at the February meeting. The motion passed.

Jen FitzGerald, President, reminded everyone that the Web Site/Publicity Director board position was still open and anyone

that was interested should contact a board member.

Jen FitzGerald, President, announced the names of the awards presented at the end of the year for most new pages written and most pages edited. The names are as follows: Most new pages for a pre-published author: The Rising Star Award. Most new pages for a published author: The Shinning Star Award. Most edited pages by a pre-published author: The Silver Spur Award. Most edited pages by a published author: The Golden Spur Award. Each winner would, upon approval of the budget, receive a \$25 gift card to the retailer of their choice.

It was noted that the prizes for the GE contest and the Writing awards are in the budget for 2007 to include current contest and 2006 and 2007 writing awards. Gina Nelson moved to accept the names as presented and the awards as stipulated. The motion was seconded by Ron Campbell. The motion passed.

It was noted that as a chapter we want to encourage members to write and have the rewards as an incentive.

Um . . . is your name on this list?

Why not?

What are you waiting for? This is a new year, a new month, filled with new opportunities.

Finished your manuscript, didn't you? It's terrible or wonderful. It needs tweaking or a major overhaul. It's there, lurking in your computer, staring at you, calling to you from your list of 'My Documents'. What are you waiting for? Not sure?

My critique partners and I play a game of 'What if?' when we're plotting. Try that for your finished manuscript.

What if you send your manuscript to the editor you sorta, kinda mentioned it to last year? At your last conference? Last mini-conference?

What if you send it to that agent who is taking on new clients? What about the associate editor who was recently promoted and is actively looking for new authors?

What's the worst that could happen? They'll say no. Your much slaved-over, hard-to-birth baby will be turned down. Your great American novel doesn't fit their line; they bought one just like it a month ago; it's not marketable enough in its present state; it's not what they were looking for; it's not dark enough, light enough, humorous enough, long enough.

However the agent/editor rejects your manuscript, bottom line, they reject it. Did you notice I said they reject your manuscript? It's not you rejected—no matter how personal it feels. This piece of work you created would not exist but for your imagination and sheer will. A rejection, any rejection can't take away your success of completing a novel. Don't read more into the rejection than what exists. The rejection is of the work--not you.

No one and nothing can take your power unless you willingly, by choice, give it away. STOP! Think about that for a moment. Roll it around in your head. Taste it. The power is yours. A rejection means no--this one time and absolutely, positively, NOTHING more.

Believe you won't survive a rejection? You will. When it comes in, read it—DO NOT destroy it. Put the letter in a file, a drawer, a place where you can find it again. Call your critique partners, tell them how misunderstood you are, how that agent/editor missed signing the perfect new author. Have a glass of wine, root beer, bottled water and CELEBRATE.

Why? Because you are one of the chosen. You, fellow writer, have created words with meaning that allowed a reader to travel into a new world and find happiness, completeness, satisfaction. You accomplished that miracle, then you were gutsy enough to put your work on the line and let someone, hopefully impartial, judge what you created. Celebration is indeed the order of business for the day.

That's the worst that can happen. Does that seem so bad? So scary?

What's the best that could happen? The agent calls and asks for a partial or the entire manuscript. The editor calls and says she'd like to send the full on to the senior editor. The publisher calls and offers you a three book, six-figure deal. Think big.

Believe you won't survive? You will. Have a glass of wine, root beer, bottled water and CELEBRATE. However, if you get the three book, six-figure deal, do not call your critique partners. Rent a limo, pick them all up and go out to dinner.

The power is yours, future PROs. What are you waiting for? Opportunities abound—one day at a time, one chance at a time. Mail your manuscript and apply for PRO.

# Spotlight On... Mindy Obenhaus

## ***When did you start writing fiction? Why?***

I wrote my first work of fiction, complete with Polaroid photos, when I was in the fourth grade. Entitled *Cindy's Dream*, it chronicled the adventures of a young girl who went over the rainbow in a doll cradle, accompanied by dolls and toys that had come to life. Now it sounds like some bizarre B-movie. But at the time, it earned me an A.

About three years ago, I did what many writers have done. I put down a book and thought, "I can do that." I'd had stories rolling around in my head for years. I'd just never considered putting them down on paper.

Writing quickly became my passion, but also a spiritual journey. I didn't plan to write inspirational or Christian fiction until God called me to it. And I have to admit, I was rather reluctant. I worried that I would be held to a standard I couldn't live up to. But you know what? Christians aren't perfect people, and that's what I try to convey in my writing. God loves us in spite of our shortcomings.

## ***Tell us a little about yourself, and your family.***

My husband, Richard, is my biggest fan. He's also my harshest critic. There have been times when I've had to remind him to say something nice [about my writing] so I don't smother him in his sleep. I shouldn't complain. I'm thrilled to have his support. We have five great kids ranging in age

from 23 to 8--three girls, two boys--as well as two grandsons and a beautiful new granddaughter.

## ***How long have you lived in Texas? What brought you here?***

Moved to Texas from Michigan in 1982. I had no desire to go to college, and while the job market had bottomed out in Michigan, things were flourishing here. I married shortly thereafter, and in 1984 the military took us to Germany for 3 years then South Dakota, and finally Iceland. I've been back in Texas since 1991. I love Texas and, thanks to my husband, whose several times great-uncle was Davy Crockett, am firmly grounded in its history. As far as I'm concerned, I'm a Texan.

## ***Why set your stories in Texas?***

First of all, write what you know, and I believe I have the best of both worlds. While I live in the burbs of DFW, we have a ranch near Columbus, Texas, about 70 miles west of Houston, on I-10. It's a working cattle ranch and our retreat from the chaos of city life. I've had adventures out there I never would have imagined. Things like being stung by a scorpion and stepping on a Copperhead. Yes, he was alive. Things like putting on our own fireworks display or loading Thanksgiving dinner onto the back of a tractor to take it my mother-in-law's because the flood water's were too deep for anyone to make it into our place.

The land itself is a huge inspiration for me. In my first book, *Stolen Dreams*, the heroine lives in the city, but her

heart is in the country. In particular, a place on her family's ranch called Willow Springs. Walnut Hill, an area of our ranch, was where it all started. Very serene.

I've also met some charming and interesting characters in that area. People who make a party out of butchering a pig. In the fall, life comes to a grinding halt on Friday nights so the entire family can head to the high school football game to watch their son play, or their daughter march with the band. They work hard, they play hard, but their priorities are in order.

## ***I know you recently attended the Citizen's Police Academy. Tell us about it.***

I highly recommend it. You come away with a better understanding of your community and a huge appreciation for the officers. We covered all aspects of the police department, from routine traffic stops to jail procedures to criminal investigations to SWAT.

We even had firearms training where we shot everything from pistols to a machine gun. Pretty cool. I discovered I was a really good shot.

## ***What do you like to read? Who are your favorite authors?***

Hmm . . . well, obviously I like to read romance, or at least something with romance in it. It's just got to have a happily-ever-after. I like straight romance as well as romantic suspense and women's fiction.

## Tape Review: RW10-110 ~ Conflict Ahead: A Roadmap for Writers

Cleverly embedded in a metaphorical journey/map, author Christy Ridgeway explores three conflict basics: external conflict, internal conflict, and what she refers to as the “between conflict—that added dynamic between the hero and heroine that infuse every situation they encounter in the story.

Utilizing references to

Deb Dixon's Goal, Motivation and Conflict and Jack Bickham's Scene and Structure, Christy discusses each type of conflict and how to select ones that work together organically for the most impact in a story. Recommended Level: (B)

GEM: The “between characters” concept—not necessarily why the hero and heroine can't be together, but that added something to get the

conflict going until they fall in love and must conquer the deeper romantic conflict. (Example: the heroine is by-the book, the hero makes his own rules.)

Publishing is a highly competitive industry, so write the very best book you can. If you're writing in different genres, submit your favorite manuscript and say in your cover letter that you write other genres.

If you have any particular expertise relating to your project, any places on the internet to read your writing, publishing history (if any), even membership in a writing group. Don't apologize for not being published, or anything else.

Check the submission before you send it. Are all the pages there? Are any blank? Is the font readable? Times New Roman and Courier New are the fonts most preferred.

If they still haven't acted, thank them for their time. But remember, the door isn't necessarily shut on the submission, only on the exclusivity. When asked what makes a writer stand out, Nephele said, "Great writing is always the answer." Strong voice and storytelling are a must. Avoid what she called 'Chapter Four letdown,' where the first three chapters are polished but the fourth chapter onward, not so much. Common distractions are unreadable fonts, bad grammar, poor spelling, and weak mechanics. Keep honing your craft

Other things that help you stand out are a willingness to promote yourself; blogging that's current, a professional attitude, and knowing what you want out of the relationship with your agent.

Remember, she's not your mom, therapist, or best friend. She's an advocate for you in the publishing world.

An author website, even if it only has an excerpt and contact information, is now expected in the industry. After "the call", use your gut. If you feel you mesh with the agent and she'll be good for your career, say yes. But don't be afraid to say no if the deal feels fair, but the person doesn't seem like a fit with you.

## January Program Recap: Amazing Face Reading

At our January meeting, Ann Marks presented Amazing Face reading based on the book of the same name by attorney Mac Fulfer.

While face reading goes back thousands of years to China, the father of face reading is a Swiss monk.

It is only in the last half of the twentieth century that face reading became popular especially in law enforcement and in jury selection.

Ms. Marks reminded us that face reading is NOT mind reading and while we all can read faces, it is only through real life experience that we learn to read them very well.
